AUTHORIZING APPLICATION FOR A LEAP IMPLEMENTATION GRANT

WHEREAS, the State of New Jersey has appropriated \$10 million for Shared Services and School District Consolidation Study and Implementation Grants to assist local units with the study, development, and implementation of new shared and regional services; and

WHEREAS, the Department of Community Affairs, Division of Local Government Services (DLGS) is tasked with administering these grant funds through the Local Efficiency Achievement Program (LEAP); and

WHEREAS, LEAP Implementation Grants exist to support costs associated with shared service implementation to ensure that meaningful, efficiency generating initiatives are not hindered by short term transitional expenses; and

WHEREAS, the Township of Robbinsville and the Borough of Hightstown propose to enter into a shared services agreement, but face certain expenses associated with implementation that present a burden to the local units; and

WHEREAS, the purpose of this shared services agreement is to construct and share a new police/municipal court facility that is designed to increase efficiency, enhance public safety and provide cost savings to both municipalities, which will benefit the residents of both participating local units; and

WHEREAS, the Township of Robbinsville has agreed to be the lead agency in this program and will submit the application to DLGS on behalf of all participating units; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Governing Body of the Borough of Hightstown, that the Borough of Hightstown does hereby join with the Township of Robbinsville in applying for a LEAP Implementation Grant in the amount of \$250,000 to support implementation of this shared service.

<u>Sneah Sukhadia, Captain First Aid Squad - Spoke</u> about the capital requests for the First Aid Squad. They are requesting a new ambulance. Last year they spent over \$55,000 In repairs on the 2006 ambulance.

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There being further comments, Mayor Quattrone closed the public comment period.

DISCUSSION – BUDGET 2022

Discussion ensued prioritizing water sewer projects. Council agreed the order of projects will be Water Tower Refurbishment, AWWTP Drywall Pumphouse and the two activated sludge tanks at the AWWTP. George Lang, CFO explained that Water/Sewer projects do not affect our current account bonding capacity provided that the water/sewer departments remain self-liquidating. Mr. Lang stated that if we continue to collect sludge, we can make the budget work and remain self-liquidating. There was discussion regarding water meter replacement/upgrades scheduling 250 per year. This will also be part of the lead service line replacement which is a 10-year project. Mr. Lang will have bond counsel put together a bond ordinance for all 5 projects and we will apply for Ibank funding.

Road project - A \$500,000 grant was received from NJDOT for Orchard, Meadow and Clover. The total cost of this project is \$1,867,000, this includes water/sewer upgrades. Discussion ensued. Council agreed that sidewalks around the circle will be eliminated to reduce the overall cost of the project.

First Aid Ambulance request \$280,000 - Council discussed the request. They advised the squad to get estimates to repair the 2006 ambulance. There is not enough in the budget this year to fund a new ambulance.

Parks and Recreation Capital Requests - Jordan Adler reviewed Parks and Rec request. Councilmember Misiura stated that their may be funds in the redevelopers agreement for refurbishments to Rocky Brook Park.

ORDINANCE 2022-05

BOROUGH OF HIGHTSTOWN COUNTY OF MERCER STATE OF NEW JERSEY

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 25, "STORMWATER CONTROL" OF THE REVISED GENERAL ORDINANCES OF THE BOROUGH OF HIGHTSTOWN

WHEREAS, the Borough of Hightstown maintains a Tier A MS4 New Jersey Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NJPDES) Stormwater Permit; and

WHEREAS, the Borough is required to develop, update, implement, and enforce a program to ensure adequate long-term cleaning, operation, and maintenance of stormwater facilities not owned or operated by the Borough; and

WHEREAS, at the recommendation of the Borough Engineer, and in order to remain in compliance with the Stormwater Permit, the Hightstown Borough Council has agreed to modify the existing language of certain provisions currently contained within the Borough Code.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED, by the Mayor and Borough Council of the Borough of Hightstown, in the County of Mercer and State of New Jersey, as follows:

<u>Section 1</u>. Chapter 25 "Stormwater Control," of the "Revised General Ordinances of the Borough of Hightstown," is hereby amended and supplemented in the following respects (additions are shown with <u>underline</u>, deletions are shown with <u>strikeout</u>):

25-1-11 Requirements Regarding Dumpsters and Other Refuse Containers

A. Purpose

This Section requires dumpsters and other refuse containers that are outdoors or exposed to stormwater to be covered at all times and prohibits the spilling, dumping, leaking, or otherwise discharge of liquids, semi-liquids or solids from

the containers to the municipal separate storm sewer system(s) operated by the Borough of Hightstown and/or the waters of the State so as to protect public health, safety and welfare, and to prescribe penalties for the failure to comply.

B. Definitions

For the purpose of this Section, the following terms, phrases, words, and their derivations shall have the meanings stated herein unless their use in the text of this Chapter clearly demonstrates a different meaning. When not inconsistent with the context, words used in the present tense include the future, words used in the plural number include the singular number, and words used in the singular number include the plural number. The word "shall" is always mandatory and not merely directory.

- 1. Municipal separate storm sewer system (MS4) a conveyance or system of conveyances (including roads with drainage systems, municipal streets, catch basins, curbs, gutters, ditches, manmade channels, or storm drains) that is owned or operated by Hightstown Borough or other public body, and is designed and used for collecting and conveying stormwater.
- 2. Person any individual, corporation, company, partnership, firm, association, or political subdivision of this State subject to municipal jurisdiction.
- 3. Refuse container any waste container that a person controls whether owned, leased, or operated, including dumpsters, trash cans, garbage pails, and plastic trash bags.
- 4. Stormwater means water resulting from precipitation (including rain and snow) that runs off the land's surface, is transmitted to the subsurface, is captured by separate storm sewers or other sewerage or drainage facilities, or is conveyed by snow removal equipment.
- 5. Waters of the State means the ocean and its estuaries, all springs, streams and bodies of surface or ground water, whether natural or artificial, within the boundaries of the State of New Jersey or subject to its jurisdiction.

C. Applicability

- 1. Any person who controls, whether owned, leased, or operated, a refuse container or dumpster must ensure that such container or dumpster is covered at all times and shall prevent refuse from spilling out or overflowing.
- 2. Any person who owns, leases or otherwise uses a refuse container or dumpster must ensure that such container or dumpster does not leak or otherwise discharge liquids, semi-liquids or solids to the municipal separate storm sewer system(s) operated by the Borough of Hightstown.

D. Exceptions

- 1. Permitted temporary demolition containers
- 2. Litter receptacles (other than dumpsters or other bulk containers)
- 3. Individual homeowner trash and recycling containers
- 4. Refuse containers at facilities authorized to discharge stormwater under a valid NJPDES permit
- 5. Large bulky items (e.g., furniture, bound carpet and padding, white goods placed curbside for pickup)

E. Enforcement and Penalties

- 1. This Section shall be enforced by the Stormwater Management Coordinator and/or Superintendent of the Department of Public Works and/or their designee of the Borough of Hightstown.
- 2. Any person who is found to be in violation of this Section shall be subject to penalties as stated in Chapter 1, Article 1-5 of the Revised General Ordinances of the Borough of Hightstown.

25—1-1112. Penalties

Any person(s) who erects, constructs, alters, repairs, converts, maintains, or uses any building, structure or land in violation of this ordinance shall be subject to the following penalties: Chapter 1, Article 1-5 of the Revised General Ordinances of the Borough of Hightstown.

25-1-1213. Severability

Each section, subsection, sentence, clause and phrase of this Ordinance is declared to be an independent section, subsection, sentence, clause and phrase, and the finding or holding of any such portion of this Ordinance to be unconstitutional, void, or ineffective for any cause, or reason, shall not affect any other portion of this Ordinance.

Section 2. In the event that any portion of this Ordinance is found to be invalid for any reason by any Court of competent jurisdiction, such judgment shall be limited in its effect only to that portion of the Ordinance actually adjudged to be invalid, and the remaining portions of this Ordinance shall be deemed severable therefrom and shall not be affected.

<u>Section 3.</u> All other Ordinances or parts of Ordinances inconsistent herewith are hereby repealed to the extent of such inconsistency.

<u>Section 4.</u> This Ordinance shall become effective upon final passage and publication in accordance with the law.

BOROUGH OF HIGHTSTOWN COUNTY OF MERCER STATE OF NEW JERSEY

AN ORDINANCE ESTABLISHING CERTAIN NEW REGULATIONS CONCERNING VEHICLES AND TRAFFIC, AND AMENDING AND SUPPLEMENTING CHAPTER 7, ENTITLED "TRAFFIC," OF THE REVISED GENERAL ORDINANCES OF THE BOROUGH OF HIGHTSTOWN, NEW JERSEY

WHEREAS, the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Hightstown (the "Borough") wish to establish certain

new regulations concerning vehicles and traffic within the Borough; and

WHEREAS, the new regulations will prohibit vehicles which have a gross vehicle registered weight in excess of four (4) tons from operating on all municipal owned streets, except for those streets specifically identified by the Borough or as otherwise provided by the Borough; and

WHEREAS, the new regulations will also prohibit vehicles from turning at the intersection of North Main Street and Wyckoff Mills Road, when traveling in a northbound or southbound direction on North Main Street; and

WHEREAS, the Mayor and Council believe that these new regulations will improve traffic flow in the Borough, and that the regulations are in furtherance of the health, safety and welfare of the public; and

WHEREAS, in order to codify these new regulations, the Mayor and Council wish to make certain changes to Chapter 7, entitled "Traffic," of the Revised General Ordinances of the Borough of Hightstown, New Jersey, as set forth below.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED, by the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Hightstown as follows:

<u>Section 1</u>. That vehicles which have a gross vehicle registered weight in excess of four (4) tons are hereby prohibited from operating on all municipal owned streets, except for those streets specifically identified by Ordinance by the Borough or as otherwise provided by the Borough.

<u>Section 2</u>. That all vehicles are hereby prohibited from turning at the intersection of North Main Street and Wyckoff Mills Road, when traveling in a northbound or southbound direction on North Main Street

<u>Section 3.</u> That all relevant Borough officials and/or employees are hereby authorized and directed to undertake all actions that are necessary to implement the aforesaid new traffic regulations, including but not limited to the posting of appropriate signage and/or other markings to alert the public, as well as to seek any approvals which may be necessary from any other governmental agencies or authorities which may have jurisdiction over the matters set forth in the within Ordinance.

<u>Section 4.</u> That Chapter 7, entitled "Traffic", of the Revised General Ordinances of the Borough of Hightstown, New Jersey, is hereby amended and supplemented to read as follows (underline for additions, strikethroughs for deletions):

§ 7-1-18 Truck Route System.

[Ord. No. 1-16-92]

A truck route system upon which trucks in excess of four tons gross weight may travel is hereby established on the following streets or parts of streets:

All vehicles having a gross vehicle registered weight in excess of four (4) tons shall be excluded from all municipal owned streets, except for the specific municipal streets identified above. Such vehicles shall, however, be permitted on all streets for the purpose of the local pickup and delivery of materials only. Exempt vehicles include all Borough-owned vehicles, school buses, and recycling trucks.

<u>Section-5.</u> That all other Ordinances or parts of Ordinances inconsistent herewith are hereby repealed to the extent of such inconsistency.

<u>Section 6.</u> That this Ordinance shall become effective upon final passage and publication in accordance with the law, following the receipt of any approvals deemed necessary by any other governmental agencies or authorities which may have jurisdiction over the matters set forth in the within Ordinance and the installation of proper signage by the Borough of Hightstown and/or the County of Mercer.

BOND ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR IMPROVEMENTS TO THE WATER-SEWER UTILITY IN AND BY THE BOROUGH OF HIGHTSTOWN, IN THE COUNTY OF MERCER, NEW JERSEY, APPROPRIATING \$1,100,000 THEREFOR AND AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$1,100,000 BONDS OR NOTES OF THE BOROUGH TO FINANCE THE COST THEREOF.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOROUGH COUNCIL OF THE BOROUGH OF HIGHTSTOWN, IN THE COUNTY OF MERCER, NEW JERSEY (not less than two-thirds of all members thereof affirmatively concurring) AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. The improvement described in Section 3(a) of this bond ordinance is hereby authorized to be

undertaken by the Borough of Hightstown, in the County of Mercer, New Jersey (the "Borough"). For the

improvement or purpose described in Section 3(a), there is hereby appropriated the sum of \$1,100,000. Pursuant to

N.J.S.A. 40A:2-11(c), no down payment is provided for the costs of the improvement since the project described in

Section 3(a) hereof is expected to be funded through the New Jersey Infrastructure Bank.

Section 2. In order to finance the cost of the improvement or purpose, negotiable bonds are hereby authorized

to be issued in the principal amount of \$1,100,000 pursuant to the Local Bond Law. In anticipation of the issuance of

the bonds, negotiable bond anticipation notes are hereby authorized to be issued pursuant to and within the limitations

prescribed by the Local Bond Law.

Section 3. (a) The improvement hereby authorized and the purpose for the financing of which the bonds are

to be issued is water tank painting and repairs for the water-sewer utility, including all work and materials necessary

therefor and incidental thereto.

(b) The estimated maximum amount of bonds or bond anticipation notes to be issued for the improvement or

purpose is as stated in Section 2 hereof.

(c) The estimated cost of the improvement or purpose is equal to the amount of the appropriation herein made

therefor.

Section 4. All bond anticipation notes issued hereunder shall mature at such times as may be determined by

the chief financial officer; provided that no bond anticipation note shall mature later than one year from its date unless

such bond anticipation notes are permitted to mature at such later date in accordance with applicable law. The bond

anticipation notes shall bear interest at such rate or rates and be in such form as may be determined by the chief

financial officer. The chief financial officer shall determine all matters in connection with bond anticipation notes

issued pursuant to this bond ordinance, and the chief financial officer's signature upon the bond anticipation notes

shall be conclusive evidence as to all such determinations. All bond anticipation notes issued hereunder may be

renewed from time to time subject to the provisions of the Local Bond Law or applicable law. The chief financial

officer is hereby authorized to sell part or all of the bond anticipation notes from time to time at public or private sale

and to deliver them to the purchasers thereof upon receipt of payment of the purchase price plus accrued interest from

their dates to the date of delivery thereof. The chief financial officer is directed to report in writing to the governing

body at the meeting next succeeding the date when any sale or delivery of the bond anticipation notes pursuant to this

bond ordinance is made. Such report must include the amount, the description, the interest rate and the maturity schedule of the bond anticipation notes sold, the price obtained and the name of the purchaser.

Section 5. The Borough hereby certifies that it has adopted a capital budget or a temporary capital budget, as applicable. The capital or temporary capital budget of the Borough is hereby amended to conform with the provisions of this bond ordinance to the extent of any inconsistency herewith. To the extent that the purposes authorized herein are inconsistent with the adopted capital or temporary capital budget, a revised capital or temporary capital budget has been filed with the Division of Local Government Services.

Section 6. The following additional matters are hereby determined, declared, recited and stated:

- (a) The improvement or purpose described in Section 3(a) of this bond ordinance is not a current expense. It is an improvement or purpose that the Borough may lawfully undertake as a general improvement, and no part of the cost thereof has been or shall be specially assessed on property specially benefitted thereby.
- (b) The period of usefulness of the improvement or purpose within the limitations of the Local Bond Law, according to the reasonable life thereof computed from the date of the bonds authorized by this bond ordinance, is 15 years.
- (c) The Supplemental Debt Statement required by the Local Bond Law has been duly prepared and filed in the office of the Clerk, and a complete executed duplicate thereof has been filed in the office of the Director of the Division of Local Government Services in the Department of Community Affairs of the State of New Jersey. Such statement shows that the gross debt of the Township as defined in the Local Bond Law is increased by the authorization of the bonds and notes provided in this bond ordinance by \$1,100,000, and the obligations authorized herein will be within all debt limitations prescribed by that Law.
- (d) An aggregate amount not exceeding \$65,000 for items of expense listed in and permitted under N.J.S.A. 40A:2-20 is included in the estimated cost indicated herein for the purpose or improvement.
- Section 7. The Borough hereby declares the intent of the Borough to issue bonds or bond anticipation notes in the amount authorized in Section 2 of this bond ordinance and to use the proceeds to pay or reimburse expenditures for the costs of the purposes described in Section 3(a) of this bond ordinance. This Section 7 is a declaration of intent within the meaning and for purposes of Treasury Regulations.
- Section 8. Any grant moneys received for the purpose described in Section 3(a) hereof shall be applied either to direct payment of the cost of the improvement or to payment of the obligations issued pursuant to

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this bond ordinance. The amount of obligations authorized but not issued hereunder shall be reduced to the extent

that such funds are so used.

Section 9. The chief financial officer of the Borough is hereby authorized to prepare and to update from time

to time as necessary a financial disclosure document to be distributed in connection with the sale of obligations of the

Borough and to execute such disclosure document on behalf of the Borough. The chief financial officer is further

authorized to enter into the appropriate undertaking to provide secondary market disclosure on behalf of the Borough

pursuant to Rule 15c2-12 of the Securities and Exchange Commission (the "Rule") for the benefit of holders and

beneficial owners of obligations of the Borough and to amend such undertaking from time to time in connection with

any change in law, or interpretation thereof, provided such undertaking is and continues to be, in the opinion of a

nationally recognized bond counsel, consistent with the requirements of the Rule. In the event that the Borough fails

to comply with its undertaking, the Borough shall not be liable for any monetary damages, and the remedy shall be

limited to specific performance of the undertaking.

Section 10. The full faith and credit of the Borough are hereby pledged to the punctual payment of the principal

of and the interest on the obligations authorized by this bond ordinance. The obligations shall be direct, unlimited

obligations of the Borough, and the Borough shall be obligated to levy ad valorem taxes upon all the taxable real

property within the Borough for the payment of the obligations and the interest thereon without limitation of rate or

amount.

Section 11. This bond ordinance shall take effect 20 days after the first publication thereof after final adoption,

as provided by the Local Bond Law.

WHEREAS, a portion of Stockton Street (County Route 571) between the limit of the State right-of-way of U.S. Route 130 in East Windsor and the intersection of Dutch Neck Road and Oak Lane in Hightstown is in need of curbs and sidewalks; and

WHEREAS, Hightstown and East Windsor desire to install curbs and sidewalks on both sides of Stockton Street from the limit of the State right-of-way of U.S. Route 130 in East Windsor to the intersection of Dutch Neck Road and Oak Lane in Hightstown (the "Project"), and agree to share in the cost in accordance with the terms of this Agreement; and

WHEREAS, Hightstown has agreed to serve as the lead agency for the design, bidding and construction administration relating to the Project; and

WHEREAS, the "Uniform Shared Services and Consolidation Act"

N.J.S.A. 40A:65-1, et seq. (the "Act"), permits local units of this State to enter into a contract with any other local unit for the joint provision within their combined jurisdictions of any service which any party to the agreement is empowered to render within its own jurisdiction; and

WHEREAS, East Windsor and Hightstown have authorized and approved this Agreement by Resolution duly adopted pursuant to N.J.S.A. 40A:65-5 of the Act.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual agreements and covenants herein contained, the parties agree as follows:

- 1. Hightstown shall serve as the lead agency regarding the Project. In that capacity, Hightstown shall perform all design, engineering, bidding and construction administration services for the Project, pursuant to the terms and conditions set forth in this Agreement.
- 2. The services referenced in Paragraph 1 above shall be performed in consultation with East Windsor.
- 3. Bidding for the Project shall be undertaken in accordance with the Local Public Contracts Law, N.J.S.A. 40A:11-1, et seq. (the "LPCL"). Bid documents will be prepared in a manner that requires all submitted bids to separately detail all expenses concerning the limits of the Project that are located in Hightstown and all expenses concerning the limits of the Project that are located in East Windsor.
- 4. Hightstown will award the contract for the Project to the lowest responsible bidder after review and consultation with East Windsor of all submitted bids. Upon contract award, a preconstruction conference will be scheduled with East Windsor and Hightstown.
- Hightstown and East Windsor will be independently responsible for providing general oversight and construction administration services for the Project, including processing of change orders and

- payment requests for construction work performed in their respective jurisdictions. East Windsor will provide Hightstown with a Resolution from its governing body showing approval of each change order and payment request.
- 6. The parties agree that the costs and expenses associated with the Project shall be allocated and paid between the parties as follows:
 - A. East Windsor shall deposit with Hightstown the following sums: (1) \$11,275.00 for surveying services (which includes costs for police protection); (2) \$18,000.00 for engineering design and permit preparation services; (3) \$5,000.00 for construction administration services; (4) \$500.00 for East Windsor's one-half split of the estimated \$1,000.00 Soil Conservation District permit fees; and (5) \$300.00 for East Windsor's one-half split of the estimated NJDOT permit fees. It is understood by the parties that the permit amount fees referenced at (4) and (5) herein are estimated and that if the actual permit fees cost more or less than the amounts referenced, each party shall be responsible for one-half of the actual amount. These funds will be paid by East Windsor to Hightstown at the time of final execution of the within Agreement, and shall be deposited by Hightstown into a separate escrow account.
 - B. East Windsor agrees to pay Hightstown for all services related to construction activities undertaken concerning the East Windsor limits of the Project, along with the amounts referenced in Paragraph 6(A) above. Prior to award of a construction contract for the Project, East Windsor shall pay to Hightstown the estimated funds that relate to the East Windsor portion of the Project. The East Windsor funds will be held in escrow by Hightstown and paid out to the construction contractor following East Windsor's review and prior approval of the East Windsor quantities of the contractor's payment request as contained in each invoice.
 - C. Hightstown and East Windsor will each pay for police services for construction within their respective jurisdictions.
- This Agreement shall terminate upon the expiration of the maintenance bond provided by the construction contractor for this Project.
- 8. In the event that any provision of this Agreement shall, for any reason, be determined to be invalid, illegal or unenforceable in any respect, the parties hereto shall negotiate in good faith and agree to such amendments, modifications or supplements of or to this Agreement, or such other appropriate actions as shall, to the maximum extent practicable in light of such determination, implement and give effect to the intentions of the parties as reflected herein. Lead Service Line Investigation

ORDINANCE 2022-17

BOROUGH OF HIGHTSTOWN COUNTY OF MERCER STATE OF NEW JERSEY

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING AND SUPPLEMENTING ARTICLE 15-2, ENTITLED "ADMINISTRATION AND ENFORCEMENT," OF CHAPTER 15, "FIRE PREVENTION AND PROTECTION," OF "THE REVISED GENERAL ORDINANCES OF THE BOROUGH OF HIGHTSTOWN"

WHEREAS, the Borough of Hightstown (the "Borough") has previously established certain fire prevention and protection regulations within the Borough; and

WHEREAS, per the recommendation of the Borough's Fire Official, the Borough Council wishes to make certain revisions to the existing fire prevention and protection regulations.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE AND IT IS HEREBY ORDAINED, by the Borough Council of the Borough of Hightstown, in the County of Mercer and State of New Jersey, as follows:

<u>Section 1.</u> Article 15-2, entitled "Administration and Enforcement," of Chapter 15, "Fire Prevention and Protection," of "The Revised General Ordinances of the Borough of Hightstown," is hereby amended and supplemented in the following respects (additions are shown with <u>underline</u>; deletions are shown with <u>strikeout</u>):

Article 15-2. Administration and Enforcement

§ 15-2-1. Definitions.

LIFE HAZARD USE

The premises and uses identified in the New Jersey Uniform Fire Code at N.J.A.C. 5:70-2.4, 2.4A, 2.4B, 2.4C and 2.4D, respectively, as may be amended from time to time.

NON-LIFE HAZARD USE

All other premises and uses which do not meet the definition of Life Hazard Use.

§ 15-2-12. Uniform Fire Safety Act; Fire Prevention Code.

Pursuant to N.J.S. 52:27D-202 of the Uniform Fire Safety Act, the <u>New Jersey</u> Uniform Fire Code, N.J.A.C. 5:70-1, et seq., and the Fire Prevention Code are hereby adopted and shall be locally enforced throughout the Borough.

§ 15-2-23. Local Enforcing Agency Designated.

The local enforcing agency shall be the Bureau of Fire Safety.

§ 15-2-34. Enforcement; Bureau of Fire Safety.

The Fire Official shall be responsible for the enforcement of the Fire Prevention Code of the Borough. To assist in the performance of the responsibilities and duties placed upon the Fire Official, a Bureau of Fire Safety is hereby created consisting of the Fire Official and such other fire inspectors as may be designated as set forth in § 15-2-4.

§ 15-2-45. Fire Official; Fire Inspectors.

- A. Fire Official. The Bureau shall operate under the direct supervision and control of the Fire Official. The Fire Official shall be responsible for the direct administration and enforcement of the Fire Prevention Code.
- B. Fire Inspectors. Upon recommendation of the Fire Official, the Mayor and Council may designate such number of fire inspectors as shall from time to time be deemed necessary. Such fire inspectors shall be selected through an examination to determine their fitness for the position.

§ 15-2-56. Inspections of Non-Life Hazard Uses.

The Bureau of Fire Safety shall enforce the State Uniform Fire Safety Act and regulations promulgated pursuant thereto and the Fire Prevention Code in all structures and premises, except one family and two family dwellings, and buildings owned or operated by the Federal government or State and interstate agencies, provided that common areas, storage and mechanical areas and other areas not used as dwellings in multifamily structures shall also be subject to inspection. Inspections shall be made as often as necessary for the purpose of ascertaining and causing to be corrected any conditions liable to cause a fire or any violations of the provisions of the Fire Prevention Code or any other ordinance affecting fire hazards. The Fire Official or other qualified fire inspector shall inspect each structure covered by this article at least annually.

The Bureau of Fire Safety shall inspect all buildings, structures or premises not listed as life hazard uses (referred hereafter as non-life hazard uses), with the exception of owner-occupied detached one- and two-family dwellings that are used exclusively for residential purposes. Individual dwelling units in multi-family dwellings are also excluded from this inspection program with the exception of the common egress, storage, and mechanical areas of such structures. All non-life hazard uses shall be inspected periodically as follows:

- A. At least every twenty-four (24) months, except as set forth in "B" below.
- B. Non-life hazard uses that are required by New Jersey law or rule to have annual inspections shall be inspected at least every twelve (12) months.

Nothing herein shall prohibit the Bureau of Fire Safety from inspecting any non-life hazard more frequently at the request of the occupant and subject to the inspection fees set forth herein.

§ 15-2-7. Registration of Non-Life Hazard Uses.

- A. Owners of businesses and/or other uses constituting industrial, commercial, professional services, educational, multi-family residential and other uses not classified as life hazard uses by the New Jersey Uniform Fire Code and which are required to be inspected herein in accordance with this article and the requirements of the New Jersey Uniform Fire Code shall register annually with the Bureau of Fire Safety as provided herein.
- B. The owners of uses required to be registered shall do so on forms provided by the Bureau of Fire Safety, which forms shall include, but not be limited to, the following information:
 - (1) The name, address, telephone number, and email address of the owner of the property upon or in which the use is located.
 - (2) The name, home address, home telephone number, and email address of the owner, operator, or registered agent of the use, if different from the owner of the property.
 - (3) The name, physical location, mailing address, and telephone number of the use or business.
 - (4) The type of use along with a description of the business of activity being conducted.
 - (5) The amount of square footage being utilized or occupied by the use or business.
 - (6) Any further information deemed necessary to identify or classify the use or business, as may be required by the Fire Official.
- C. It shall be a violation of this Article for the owner or operator of a business to fail to return such forms within thirty (30) days of being ordered to do so by the Fire Official. If the ownership is transferred, whether by sale, assignment, gift, intestate succession, devise, reorganization, receivership, foreclosure or execution process, or by any other means of conveyance, the new owner or operator shall file a new registration within thirty (30) days of such a transfer.

§ 15-2-8. Failure to Register.

A penalty of Two Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$250.00) shall be assessed for any business or use required to register that fails to register in accordance with the requirements herein.

§ 15-2-69. Life Hazard Uses.

The Bureau of Fire Safety shall conduct the periodic inspections of life hazard uses required by the Fire Prevention Code on behalf of the New Jersey Commissioner of Community Affairs.

§ 15-2-710. Other Powers and Duties of Bureau of Fire Safety.

The Bureau of Fire Safety shall have such other powers and perform such other duties as are set forth in other sections of this chapter as may be conferred and imposed from time to time by law.

§ 15-2-811. Fire Official to Recommend Additional Regulations.

It shall be the duty of the Fire Official to investigate and to recommend to the Borough Council such additional ordinances or amendments to existing ordinances as he may deem necessary for safeguarding life and property against fire.

§ 15-2-912. Administration of Bureau of Fire Safety.

The Fire Official shall serve as administrator and enforcement officer of the Bureau of Fire Safety and shall report to the Mayor and Council. He shall establish the day-to-day operating routines of the Bureau of Fire Safety and shall coordinate the activities of any technical inspectors.

§ 15-2-1013. Appointment of Fire Official; Authority; Term of Office.

- A. The Mayor and Council shall appoint a Fire Official pursuant to the State Uniform Fire Code, N.J.A.C. 5:70-1 et seq. The Fire Official shall be appointed on the basis of examination or another method selected by the Mayor and Council for determining his qualifications.
- B. The Bureau shall be under the direct supervision and control of the Fire Official who shall report to the Mayor and Council. He shall have authority, as may be necessary in the interest of public safety, health and general welfare, to establish rules and regulations, to interpret and enforce the provisions of the Fire Prevention Code and to determine special requirements applicable because of climatic or other conditions, but no such rules shall have the effect of waiving any fire safety requirements specifically provided in the Fire Prevention Code or violating accepted engineering practices involving public safety.
- C. The term of office of the Fire official shall be four years.
- D. The Fire Official may be removed from office by the Borough Administrator for failing to perform the Fire Official's duties.
- E. A qualified interim Fire Official may be appointed as needed by the Borough Administrator.

§ 15-2-**1114.** (Reserved)

§ 15-2-1215. Legal Counsel.

The Borough Attorney shall serve as legal counsel to the Bureau of Fire Safety.

- <u>Section 2.</u> All parts and provisions of any Ordinance which are inconsistent with the provisions of this Ordinance shall be repealed to the extent of such inconsistency.
- <u>Section 3.</u> The provisions of this Ordinance shall be severable. In the event that any portion of this Ordinance is found to be invalid for any reason by any Court of competent

jurisdiction, such judgment shall be limited in its effect only to the portion of the Ordinance actually adjudged invalid and shall not be deemed to affect the operation of any other portion thereof, which shall remain in full force and effect.

<u>Section 4.</u> This Ordinance shall become effective immediately upon final passage and publication in accordance with the law.

RESOLUTION IN OPPOSITION OF NEW JERSEY DIVISION OF ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGE CONTROL'S SPECIAL CONDITIONS ON LIMITED BREWERY LICENSEES

WHEREAS, the New Jersey Division of Alcoholic Beverage Control (NJABC) issued new special conditions on each limited brewery licensee (aka "craft brewery") in the state beginning Friday, July 1, 2022; and

WHEREAS, under the license conditions, craft breweries are limited to holding 25 on-site activities open to the general public annually, as well as 52 private parties. Breweries can also attend 12 off-premises events, such as town, charitable, and holiday celebrations; and

WHEREAS, under these license conditions, craft breweries have restrictions on the types of television programming they can air in their tasting rooms, restricts what types of live or recorded music they can play or host, limits what food options they can make available to customers, bans the sale of coffee, and prohibits the sale of soft drinks and other non-alcoholic beverages not made onsite at the brewery; and

WHEREAS, according to the national Brewers Association, the one-hundred and forty-one craft breweries operating in New Jersey in calendar year 2021 contributed almost \$2 billion to the state's economy, creating over 11,000 jobs at an annual income of more than \$55,000 per employee; and

WHEREAS, Hightstown Borough is home to 1 craft brewery: Old Hights Brewing Company, located at 123 West Ward Street, Hightstown, New Jersey; and

WHEREAS, these new conditions will force these local, homegrown small businesses to rethink business models and closely consider which events they should participate in or host, which will reduce their profits and their opportunities to engage in their communities; and

WHEREAS, visiting these microbreweries is about each of their unique experiences, and these proprietors have found exciting ways to engage other local businesses, vendors and artists in their communities; and

WHEREAS, the Governor and State Legislature should work with breweries to develop smart and fair law revisions and regulations that will guide state regulators at the New Jersey Division of Alcoholic Beverage Control on how to oversee the state's craft beer industry.

DRAFT ORDINANCE 2022-XX

BOROUGH OF HIGHTSTOWN COUNTY OF MERCER STATE OF NEW JERSEY

AN ORDINANCE ESTABLISHING REGULATIONS RELATING TO THE REPLACEMENT OF LEAD AND GALVANIZED SERVICE LINES AND AMENDING AND SUPPLEMENTING CHAPTER 19, ENTITLED "WATER AND SEWER," OF "THE REVISED GENERAL ORDINANCES OF THE BOROUGH OF HIGHTSTOWN" IN ORDER TO ESTABLISH A NEW ARTICLE 19-6 THEREOF TO BE KNOWN AS "REPLACEMENT OF LEAD AND GALVANIZED SERVICE LINES"

WHEREAS, the presence of lead in drinking water represents a threat to the public health, especially the health and development of New Jersey's children; and

WHEREAS, pipes containing lead that connect water mains to homes and other buildings, often called lead service lines, are a primary source of lead in drinking water; and

WHEREAS, given the risk to public health, the New Jersey State Legislature has required that each public water system replace all existing lead and galvanized service lines, including those existing on private property; and

WHEREAS, in order to protect the health and welfare of the citizens of the Borough of Hightstown, in the County of Mercer, and State of New Jersey (hereinafter the "Borough"), the Borough's Mayor and Council implemented an inventory and replacement plan for any lead and galvanized service lines existing within the Borough; and

WHEREAS, to effectuate said plan, pursuant to N.J.S.A. 58:12A-39, the Borough hereby adopts this Ordinance that allows its municipal water system to enter any property within the Borough to perform lead and galvanized service line replacements, provided that the Borough serves appropriate notices upon the proper parties.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE AND IT IS HEREBY ORDAINED, by the Borough Council of the Borough of Hightstown, in the County of Mercer and State of New Jersey, as follows:

<u>Section 1.</u> Chapter 19, entitled "Water and Sewer," of "The Revised General Ordinances of the Borough of Hightstown" (the "Borough Code"), is hereby amended and supplemented in certain limited respects, in order to establish a new Article 19-6, to be known as "Replacement of Lead and Galvanized Service Lines," to read as follows:

Article 19-6. Replacement of Lead and Galvanized Service Lines.

§ 19-6-1. Purpose and Authority.

The Borough finds that the presence of lead in drinking water represents a threat to the public health and welfare of its citizens, and that pipes containing lead that connect water mains to homes and other buildings, called lead or galvanized service lines, are significant sources of lead in drinking water. As such, under the authority granted the Borough by N.J.S.A. 58:12A-38 and N.J.S.A. 58:12A-39, the Borough hereby declares its intent to identify and replace all lead and/or galvanized service lines within the Borough, including the authority to enter upon any property within the Borough to replace all existing lead and/or galvanized service lines.

§ 19-6-2. Scope of Property Owner/Borough Responsibilities.

- A. This Chapter shall generally govern the respective responsibilities of the Borough and individual property owners as to all service lines within the Borough, except in the case of a "lead service line" to which this Article 19-6 shall specifically be applicable.
- B. A "lead service line" is a water supply connection that is made of, or lined with, a material consisting of lead, and which connects a water main to a building inlet. A lead pigtail, lead gooseneck, or other lead fitting shall be considered to be a lead service line, regardless of the composition of the service line or other portions of piping to which such piece is attached. A galvanized service line shall be considered to be a lead service line. A lead service line may be owned by the Borough, a property owner, or both.
- C. In the case of a "lead service line", the Borough shall be responsible for replacement of all pipes, tubing, and fittings connecting its water main to a building or structure, including the water meter for the property.

§ 19-6-3. Borough's Right-of-Entry to Replace Lead Service Lines.

The Borough shall have the authority to enter any property within the Borough to perform a lead service line replacement, provided that the Borough provides the owner and any residents of the property with notice at least 72 hours before entering the property, unless in the case of an emergency as determined by the New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection.

- A. For the purposes of this Subsection 19-6-3, notice to the owner and any residents of the property shall include an attempt to inform the owner and any residents in person of the date and time of the lead service line replacement, and if the owner or a resident is unable to be reached in person, the Borough shall send, by certified mail, a letter to the owner and any residents or post a written notice in a prominent location on the property which shall include:
 - (1) The scheduled date and time of the lead service line replacement and who will be performing the replacement;
 - (2) The likely extent of water service disruption;

- (3) The nearby locations where the municipality or a public water system is distributing supplementary drinking water, if any; and
- (4) Any remedies that the municipality shall take if the municipality or municipal water system, or an agent thereof, is unable to access the property.
- B. In addition to the notice requirements set forth in this Subsection 19-6-3, the Borough shall send, by certified mail, the owner a letter after the completion of the replacement stating the approximate time that the replacement occurred, and providing a brief summary of the work performed.
- <u>Section 2.</u> All parts and provisions of any Ordinance which are inconsistent with the provisions of this Ordinance shall be repealed to the extent of such inconsistency.
- <u>Section 3.</u> The provisions of this Ordinance shall be severable. In the event that any portion of this Ordinance is found to be invalid for any reason by any Court of competent jurisdiction, such judgment shall be limited in its effect only to the portion of the Ordinance actually adjudged invalid and shall not be deemed to affect the operation of any other portion thereof, which shall remain in full force and effect.
- Section 4. This Ordinance shall become effective immediately upon final passage and publication in accordance with the law.
